PRODUCTION NOTES

Happy Birthday Jesus is intended to engage the children in all aspects of the show and cover many aspects of the curriculum. This could involve art, singing, dancing, etc. The show starts with the children making a birthday card. The scene can be anywhere: in a classroom, in a bedroom, at the kitchen table, on the lounge floor; it doesn't matter.

For simplicity, it probably is best for it to represent taking place in school, thus minimising the scenery required to that which is readily available. This play can be performed anywhere; in class, in the hall, on a stage, even outdoors. It is designed to be flexible to suit all needs. Centre stage is a large frame that represents a giant version of a birthday card. It is made from white card and folded like a birthday card would be.

As the play progresses, the children will be placing items on this with sticky tape so that the audience can see them. Several children are either lying face down on the floor working with bits of paper and card etc., or could be sitting at a table doing the same. To one side of the stage is the nativity scene, with a crib, manger etc. If possible it should be unlit until the appropriate moment in the show. If this is not possible, then possibly a screen could be set in front to represent one of the inn doors. This would then be removed when required to reveal the nativity.

During **Track 1**, the children add pre-prepared shapes to represent the Donkey, Wise Men, Shepherds etc. This is done at the time indicated by the appropriate lyrics i.e. the Donkey is attached whilst they sing verse 2 etc. Similarly, during **Track 2**, they either draw a large Christmas tree and fix it to the card or use a pre-prepared cut-out and affix it. This theme, of the children drawing various characters etc. onto the card, will keep the children occupied and create a visual connection between the creation of the card and the action on the stage area.

Alternatively, if digital backdrops have been purchased, the Christmas card itself can be projected eight times as a giant Christmas card, with each different projection showing the addition the children make during each scene. It is recommended that the children create the images for the card on stage (as detailed above) so that the children can then go to the backdrop, holding the image for the giant card, and then act out placing it onto the backdrop. The children can drop the card image they have created as they 'attach' it. The child's card image will then be projected as if it has been added and 'magically' enlarged. The images will need to be added in the following order: -

Image 1: Donkey artwork

Image 2: The Three Wise Men

Image 3: Three Shepherds

Image 4: A Christmas tree

Image 5: A daisy chain of fairy lights

Image 6: A child's hand drawn donkey

Image 7: Christmas crackers and jokes

Image 8: 18 individual letters to spell out HAPPY BIRTHDAY JESUS

When the Kings (Wise Men) enter, they take presents to the crib and offer them. This could be done silently, with the crib song (backing track only) playing or you could add simple additional lines for each King, i.e. King 1: "I bring Gold;" King 2: "I bring Frankincense" and King 3: "I bring Myrrh."

At the end of the show, 18 children need to each have a piece of A4, or bigger, paper with a letter drawn on to make the phrase "HAPPY BIRTHDAY JESUS". The children need not enter in the correct order, but could come on randomly, one other child could indicate they have spelt it wrongly and the children could shuffle around to spell the phrase correctly. Each letter could be in a different colour and could be drawn in class beforehand with festive or religious symbolism added.

The aim is to be colourful and bright but to keep the staging as simple as possible. The Fairy Lights, for example, could have battery operated Christmas lights added to their costumes; the trees could be holding baubles and have earrings made of Christmas baubles etc.

Costuming should be simple using readily available items such as tea-towels, shawls etc. for the historic characters and normal school uniform or everyday clothes for the children making the card.

SCENE ONE: BIRTHDAY CARD

(The show starts with the Children making a birthday card. The scene can be anywhere: in a classroom, in a bedroom, at the kitchen table, on the lounge floor, it doesn't matter. Centre stage is a large frame that represents a giant version of the birthday card. It is made from white card and folded like a card would be. As the play progresses, the Children will be placing items on this with sticky tape so that the audience can see them. Several children are either lying face down on the floor working with bits of paper and card etc., or could be sitting at a table doing the same.)

HANNAH: How do you spell Birthday? RICHARD: B-E-R-F-D-A-Y, I think.

JENNY: No it isn't. It's got a "th" in it

(John and Alice enter and see the other children working.)

JOHN: What are you doing?

HANNAH: Making a birthday card.

RICHARD: Well we would if we could spell birthday.

ALICE: Whose birthday is it?

JENNY: Jesus's.

PAUL: That's why we have a Christmas holiday - 'cos it's His birthday.

JOHN: How old is he?

RICHARD: Two thousand years.

JOHN: (Wide eyed) Wow! My dad's thirty six and I thought he was old.

JENNY: My granddad's fifty four. I thought that he was ancient.

HANNAH: Jesus was born two thousand years ago and we're making a card for

His birthday.

ALICE: Can we help?

RICHARD: Yes.

JOHN: What are you going to put on the card?

HANNAH: Christmas things of course.

ALICE: Come on then.

TRACK 1: HAPPY BIRTHDAY JESUS

(During Track 1 the Children add pre-prepared shapes to the card to represent the Donkey, Wise Men & Shepherds. This is done at the time indicated by the appropriate lyrics.)

SCENE TWO: CHRISTMAS TREES

The crib that they put the baby in.

RICHARD: Yes. A star guided the Wise Men to the stable, didn't it?

HANNAH: And a star shone over the stable so that the shepherds could find their

way.

RICHARD: Let's draw some stars then.

ALICE: Let's pretend they're fairy lights.

TRACK 3: STARLIGHT

(The music starts as the Fairy Lights enter and join the Christmas Trees. These dancers could be dressed to look like miniature Christmas lights or stars and hold hands for the dance routine, like a string of lights. They dance for a short time whilst the Children make stars and 'daisy-chain' them together. They pin them onto the Christmas card then all sing the song.)

SCENE FOUR: THE SHEPHERDS

(Fairy Light 1 moves around the stage. A group of three Shepherds enters.)

SHEPHERD 3: Look, that one is moving. Let's follow it.

SHEPHERD 1: It looks like it's shining over Bethlehem.

SHEPHERD 2: Let's hurry down there and see why.

SHEPHERD 3: What about our sheep?

SHEPHERDS 1&2: Never mind them! Come on!

SHEPHERD 3: I'll bring this young lamb with me. I can't leave him here.

(The three Shepherds exit, Shepherd 3 carrying a small lamb.)

HANNAH: I want to draw a donkey.

JOHN: Why a donkey?

JENNY: Why not? A donkey carried Mary to Bethlehem. RICHARD: You can't have a donkey on a birthday card.

ALICE: A Christmas card is a sort of birthday card, isn't it?

PAUL: It's a card for Jesus's birthday.

JENNY: You have donkeys on Christmas cards?

RICHARD: I suppose so.

HANNAH: A donkey carried Mary all the way to Bethlehem, didn't it?

JOHN: Why didn't they catch a bus?

HANNAH: Buses hadn't been made then.

PAUL: What did they do then?

HANNAH: They walked.

RICHARD: I hate walking. Mum makes me walk to school every morning.

JENNY: Why did they walk to Bethlehem?

ALICE: They had to do the register.

HANNAH: (Busily drawing throughout this conversation) Do donkeys' ears

stick up, or flop down?

JOHN: Up!

RICHARD: (At the same time) Down!

HANNAH: I wish they'd gone by bike, I can draw one of them! (She screws up

the piece of paper and throws it away)



(At this moment the lights fade on this scene and come up on a procession, perhaps through the auditorium [hall]. It is a couple of casual groups of weary Travellers including a Donkey with Mary and Joseph. They are on their way to Bethlehem for the census.)

TRAVELLER 1: Nearly there, now.

TRAVELLER 2: Not far.

TRAVELLER 3: I hope I can get a drink. I'm thirsty.

TRAVELLER 4: It's the dusty road that makes you dry.

MARY: I can't go on, Joseph. I'm really tired.

JOSEPH: Hold on, Mary. It's not far now.

MARY: I hope so.
