Menders 1-4 join Workers 1 & 2 in the earlier "Christmas Factory" Scene, and Mum, Dad, Chrissie, John & Lisa don simple shawls & headdresses to play the Nativity characters.

Neither the Pantomime Cow nor additional Elves or Dolls will be required.

HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS

Give your children their words to learn first – enlist the help of parents here. Set a date by which they should know them; you cannot hope to rehearse movement or introduce props until words and cues are learned.

If sending home words to learn, send cues (the preceding line or two) as well, so children not only know what to say but when to say it!

Songs are best learned separately (it helps to keep the blood pressure down for all concerned).

Once rehearsing begins on stage, introduce any flats (free standing scenery) as soon as possible, so that children have their positions correct from the start. And don't forget to have one or two rehearsals with props, microphones (and lights if using) before the official dress rehearsal to allow time for children to get used to them.

Finally – this may seem obvious but is often forgotten – don't forget to practise your cast bows (arms across tummies or not?) and the order in which they should lead off stage. All too often a super show ends in foot shuffling embarrassment because no one knows quite what to do when the applause ends.

PRODUCTION NOTES

STAGING

Depending on the facilities available this show can be as simple or complex as you want. Just remember, this is not supposed to be a West End production. All most parents want to see is their child on stage. All most teachers want is to survive unscathed. So feel free to add, subtract or completely change the ideas below. And don't forget to send your comments and pictures to kate@musicline-ltd.com.

It is intended that all characters should sing as part of the Chorus when not required on stage, so seating areas close to the stage would be ideal.

Prelude

The Prelude is set in an outdoor winter scene. Nothing other than the actors is required on stage in order for them to be able to move with ease during the song.

Scene One

A snug sitting room decorated with Christmas trimmings. A couple of chairs and a Christmas tree should be on stage.

Scene Two

Inside Santa's Christmas Factory. Santa's Elves are busy making toys in this scene so a couple of trestle tables or similar would be ideal for the Elves to work at. Boxes and tools could be on the table or dotted about the stage. A chair is also required for the Doll to sit on.

Scene Three

In a field outside Santa's Christmas Factory. As in the Prelude, just a very simple outdoor winter scene with nothing else required.

Scene Four

The Menders' Shop. In this scene, the Elf Menders are busy sewing and glueing toys so again, trestle tables or similar would be ideal for the Elves to work at.

Some space at the front of the stage will be required for the nativity tableau at the end of the scene.

Scene Five

Back in the family sitting room. This scene should be set the same as Scene One.

MUSIC

All the music required to stage this production, including sound effects, is on the high quality Backing Tracks and Vocal Tracks CDs (both also available as mp3 downloads). An Easy Play Score is also available for purchase (see our website). These products are not only invaluable for performance, but can assist with the teaching of the songs too.

In addition, a brand new product: a CD-ROM or download of all the songs called **Sing it!** is also available. This CD-ROM or download can teach the songs to the children without any teacher input. Children can use it at school or at home - think of the time it will save you! Most schools use it in class on an interactive white board or in the school hall on the overhead projector to allow full cast practice.

COSTUMES

The Family should wear modern day clothes appropriate for the age of the character they are playing.

The Narrators could wear school uniform or smart clothes.

Santa should wear his famous red hat and suit with white trimmings. He should also have a long white beard and maybe some extra padding!

The Elf Workers and Menders should wear typical elf costume with pointy hats and brightly coloured clothes.

The Snowmen should be wearing all-white clothing and perhaps, white face paint. Again some extra padding is effective. Snowman 6 is the only Snowman to have a carrot nose.

The Reindeer could wear brown T-shirts and leggings with an antler headband. Face masks or face paint could enhance the costume.

The Toys should wear costumes appropriate to each group. For example:

Dolls in traditional frilly dresses.

Fairies with wings.

Clown(s) wearing brightly coloured clothes with red noses and wigs.

Soldiers in smart jackets and trousers.

The Pantomime cow could be either one child dressed in white with black patches or two children with a sheet in typical panto cow style. Both options would require a face mask or face paint.

The Cat and Mouse could wear brown, black or white T-Shirts and leggings and have facemasks or face paint to indicate what animal they are.

The Trees should wear brown T-shirts and leggings with paper leaves attached to the T-shirt.

The Snowflakes and Jack/Jill Frost should wear white or silver glittery costumes.

PRELUDE

TRACK 1: COLD, COLD WINTER

(The show opens with a lovely song which portrays a cold Christmas Eve. The song lends itself to dance and mime. Children dressed as trees take their positions before or during the intro. During the first verse, children, dressed as snowflakes, glide through this tree scape. During the second verse icy Jack (and/or Jill!) Frost dances about with spiky movements, and in the third verse a group of children skip through the trees on their way home on Christmas Eve.)

(At the end of the song the trees exit and the scene is set in a lounge with Mum, Dad and three children. They are putting finishing touches to a Christmas tree in the corner.)

SCENE ONE: AT HOME

MUM: Isn't this exciting!

DAD: Not long now, you lot.

LISA: I wonder if we'll see Father Christmas this year?

JOHN: I wonder if he'll eat as many mince pies this year?

CHRISSIE: Yes, fifteen was rather a world record.

JOHN: I think he'll be too podgy to ever get down the chimney.

DAD: Well he won't get down ours for sure, because we haven't got one.

Hooray for central heating.

JOHN: Where does he get in, Dad?

MUM: Your father leaves the back door open on Christmas Eve.

DAD: It means Santa can park his sleigh on the drive instead of on the roof.

Very dangerous parking on the roof.

CHRISSIE: At least there aren't any traffic wardens up there!

MUM: Look, it's bedtime. If you don't get to sleep he won't park here at all!

LISA: (Picking up a very old battered teddy bear from the chair. One ear

is torn, an eye is missing and a leg is hanging loose) Poor Ted is

getting very old. I can remember when Santa first brought him. Could

you mend him again, Mum? (She lovingly hugs the bear.)

MUM: Oh Lisa, Ted is very, very old, and I just can't fix him anymore. He's

just one big repair site. Perhaps Santa will bring you a new one.

LISA: I don't want another one. I just want Ted fixing a bit.

DAD: Come on now you lot, up to bed with you all, including tatty Ted!

(Children, Mum and Dad exit. Enter Narrators 1 to 6. They stand facing the audience to speak their lines clearly and slowly. It is suggested that they wear something festive.)

NARRATOR 1: Christmas Eve; the children were so very excited.

NARRATOR 2: In fact they were tired out just through being excited, and soon fell

asleep in their cosy beds.

NARRATOR 3: Now, because they were fast asleep, they didn't hear Santa's sleigh

skidding to a halt on the drive.

TRACK 2: SFX SLEIGH SKIDDING TO A HALT

NARRATOR 4: They didn't hear the back door open and close.

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TRACK 3: SFX DOOR OPENING AND CLOSING

NARRATOR 5: They didn't hear a record twenty-one mince pies being munched.

NARRATOR 6: But they did hear Santa drop one of the presents on the lounge floor!

(Narrators exit. Santa enters the lounge laden with presents. Just before he reaches the tree, the topmost present topples to the floor with a sound of breaking china.)

TRACK 4: SFX BREAKING CHINA

(Santa puts the remaining presents under the tree. He picks up the present that crashed to the floor and shakes it.)

SANTA: Oops! There goes another broken teapot. I must be more careful. Oh

dear! Oh dear!

(Enter the children rubbing their sleepy eyes. Lisa is still clutching her tatty Ted.)

ALL: Santa!

SANTA: Shhh! You'll wake the grown-ups.

JOHN: (Patting Santa on the arm to see if he's real) Father Christmas, is

that really you?

SANTA: Of course it's me! Who did you think it was – your Dad? I'm sorry I

woke you, I'm getting very clumsy in my old age! I'm afraid I've broken your Mum's teapot. *(Shakes the box)* I'll have to whizz back to Winter Wonderland and get her a new one. *(Looking very crestfallen)* Rudolphina is not going to be happy with all this extra running about.

JOHN: Don't worry Santa. I'm good at fixing things. I'll go and find Dad's

Superglue.

SANTA: Well, thanks John, but I'll be there and back in a flash.

CHRISSIE: Please can we come, Santa?

SANTA: Well, it will be a bit of a squash with three extra passengers.

LISA: I'll sit on Chrissie's knee.

JOHN: And I'll ride Rudolphina.

SANTA: Well, come on then. Go and get your coats – it's a frosty night. And go

quietly... we don't want grown-ups interfering. Oh, and don't forget that plate of mince pies. They will come in useful for the workers' tea

break.

(Santa leads as they all tip-toe offstage.)

TRACK 5: HEADING FOR HOME

(For the really ambitious production you might like to devise a way of showing the sleigh travelling during the song. Perhaps the sleigh could stay still, and characters and hand-held pictures or scenery move past it to give the illusion of movement.)

SCENE TWO: CHRISTMAS FACTORY

(The action takes place inside the factory. There are lots of elves working away with little hammers etc., making toys. The doll sits on a chair. Santa and the children enter. Lisa is still dragging her old teddy along.)

SANTA: Well children, this is where we make all the toys. My workers do a

really good job at getting things ready.

CHRISSIE: Hadn't we better get Mum's teapot and rush back?

SANTA: No, don't worry Chrissie, time sort of stands still on Christmas Eve in

Winter Wonderland. Have a good look round and enjoy your visit.

JOHN: Hey! Look at that racing car!

(He goes over to a worker making a red racer.)

WORKER 1: (Speaks in a very superior voice, lifting the car and lovingly

stroking it) You'll like this because it's got aerodynamic styling, executive spoiler, quad mega air ducts, hyper-angled aerofoil nose cone, super wide wheelbase chassis with cantilever sills, chamfered

windshield with ergonomic viewpoint...

JOHN: (Enthusiastically) Well actually, it's the colour that really caught my

eve.

WORKER 1: (*Rather let down*) Oh really! How disappointing.

JOHN: (Moves to look at the baby doll sitting on a chair) Hey Lisa! Come

and look at this baby doll.
